Center for Educators in Baton Rouge. If you are able, stop by the SLA-LASOMI table for a few minutes to greet librarians who may be interested in special libraries.

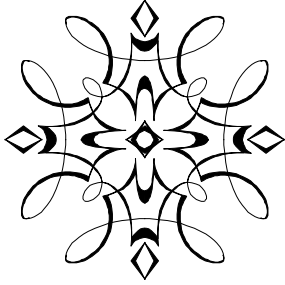

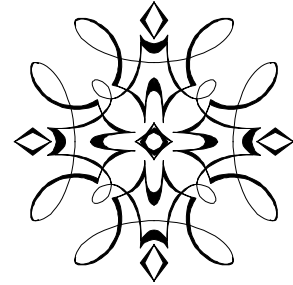

“A No Nonsense Approach to Copyright That Makes a Difference in Delivering Services”

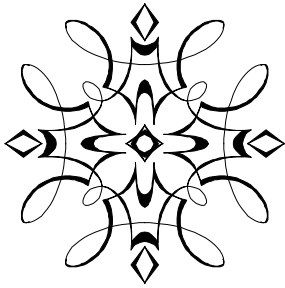

Director 1997-1999

Florence Jumonville started

out to be a school librarian, but the dearth of available school libraries in 1971 and the prospect of a classroom filled with fourth graders impelled her to enter LSU's library school. There, as an assignment for "Academic Librarianship," she wrote a paper about rare books, which led the Dean to think she was interested in them. When Boyd Cruise, director of the Historic New Orleans Collection, visited LSU in 1972 to interview candidates to administer a special library of historical materials about Louisiana, the Dean remembered Florence and recommended her for the job. She was much more interested in rare books than fourth graders and has worked in special libraries ever since, chiefly with Louisiana materials. For the past two years, she has held the position of Head of Louisiana and Special Collections at the Earl K. Long Library, University of New Orleans.

In 1997 Florence won SLA's Fannie Simon Award for publications related to special librarianship. While at the Historic New Orleans Collection, she became interested in the history of printing and publishing in New Orleans, and her work includes one book and several articles on various aspects of that subject. Florence's next major project is *Louisiana History*:

An Annotated Bibliography, which is scheduled for publication by Greenwood Press ca. 2002.

CHAPTER MEMBERS AT THE ASSOCIATION LEVEL

TIDBITS FROM OUR LOCAL/NATIONAL LEADERSHIP

[John Anderson speaks about being Chair-Elect of SLA's Geography and Map Division]

"I joined G&M in the Summer of 1995 while a SLIS student and working full time in my current position at LSU. My first SLA national meeting was in Seattle in 1997 where I attended my first G&M division meetings. I was ready to get involved in the division and volunteered for the division's publication committee. The discussions in the G&M Division business meeting centered on dissolving the division. I didn't want to let one of the avenues for new map librarians to contribute to the profession disappear without taking a chance to revive it." [Within a year John became Chair Elect of the national division.]

"Participation in national level organizations is expected for reappointment, tenure, and promotion for LSU librarians. Within the Department of Geography &

Anthropology, our department Chair recognizes and encourages faculty participation in national organizations. Additionally, the networking contacts made through national level involvement allow me to call on colleagues through out the world to locate maps and geographical information sources. This becomes very important since I essentially function as a 'solo map librarian' because there are no other large map libraries in proximity to LSU." [Special librarians have no one better to call on for assistance than each other. At times there is no one else to call on but another information specialist.]

"I spend about two hours per week on Division business. This does increase in response to deadlines. I'm concentrating on strengthening the Division by recruiting new members, getting the current membership more active, developing an attractive conference program for 2000, and recruiting corporate sponsorship for the Division." [There are ongoing public relations duties required as the leader of the national division. Good practice selling yourself to other librarians!]
