## Feature

### Checking Out San Diego's Libraries

What do zoo emissary Joan Embery, Dr. Suess's widow Audrey Geisel, Padres pitcher Trevor Hoffman, and playwright Luis Valdez have in common? Libraries! Each has filmed a television commercial promoting the use of libraries as part of a statewide library awareness campaign that had its first roll out in San Diego this summer.

On July 2, the California State Library launched the California Campaign for Libraries. The campaign is a series of 13-week media promotions that will progress through California's seven major media markets over the next two years. The campaign includes network, cable and Spanish TV; teen and Spanish radio; and bilingual billboards and bus shelters, using "The Library-Check It Out" for a theme. TV spots feature community and celebrity spokespeople promoting the value of libraries, books and reading. San Diego is the first California media market where "The Library - Check It Out" will appear. Several media partners are paying for the campaign with seed money from federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds. Specialized Media Services Marketing and Promotions of Charlotte, North Carolina has been hired to produce the campaign. The California Campaign for Libraries is designed to provide high visibility for all types of libraries in the San Diego area and to promote libraries as major players in supporting a community that reads.

The media partners are KGTV-Channel 10/ABC; Cox Cable San Diego; Time Warner Cable San Diego; KBNT-Univision Spanish language TV; teen radio station KHST-FM channel 93.3; Spanish radio stations KLVN-FM/106.5 (La Nueva) and KLQV-FM 102.9 (K-Love); and Infinity Outdoor Advertising. The campaign runs through the end of September. The campaign's impact comes from the messengers - local residents and national celebrities, offering testimonials on the value of all libraries. There is also a web site [www.sdlibraries.net](http://www.sdlibraries.net) linking to local public libraries. Essentially, the San Diego campaign is being paid for by the media partners, with the \$85,000 in LSTA funds as seed money that is being leveraged into advertising valued at over \$500,000. The entire statewide campaign will leverage a total of \$900,000 in LSTA funds into advertising valued at over \$3.2 million.

So, keep watching the airwaves, not to mention billboards and bus stops, for the library message. Chapter Programs and Holiday Party. Nearly all of you find Friday afternoon meetings the most convenient. You prefer the lower cost (\$10/member) but would attend one lunch or dinner meeting each year at a higher cost. Suggestions for topics for programs include: conducting business research; library marketing strategies; cutting-edge experience of chapter members; how to train staff; how to cope with new workplace issues, such as push technologies, digitization, homework centers; tour new libraries; archiving and digitization (what's SDSU Special Collections doing?); Baja libraries; and book mending demonstration. Everyone likes meeting at different libraries including tours or time to browse the library. Nearly all of you benefit from the networking and refreshment time at the beginning of the meeting. This time is important for traffic delays and 'getting stuck' at work. Many believe the electronic announcement (email) of the meetings would be fine, but realize that this may not be possible for a few members. Email serves as a good reminder. Some of you have attended the holiday party, have enjoyed it and will attend again in the future. Others believe it is one more commitment in a very busy time of year.

Spring Seminar. You believe that the end of March is a good time of year to attend the chapter's annual Spring Seminar. About half of you prefer attending an all-day seminar while the other half prefer only a half-day. Only a couple of you mentioned that the length of the seminar should be related to the topic. For the all-day seminar (including lunch) the \$50-\$60 fee is fair. If the chapter organized a half-day seminar, the cost would be fair only if lunch is included. Just more than half of you responding preferred not inviting vendors. Some are glad to have a chance to ask questions of the local reps while others see no need since they have no contact with vendors in their workplaces. Many of you prefer the convenience (location and parking) of the Radisson Hotel, La Jolla, although a change in venue once in a while would be nice. All of you were very much aware of the date of the seminar having received both printed and electronic announcements. Suggestions for themes for future seminars are: comparison of library application software; comparison of online search tools; how special librarians use the Internet; how to catalog electronic journals and books; how to deal with firewalls; how librarians share their resources within their own companies (including branches).

Student Scholarship. All of you responding are definite about continuing to offer the scholarship to a student in the San Jose State University/Fullerton Campus Library & Information Science Program as long as chapter funds are adequate.

General. All of you agree that the San Diego Chapter is providing avenues to help you meet the needs of your professional careers. You especially value the opportunities to network with other professionals in the field. Some of you would like opportunities to tour special libraries without the added chapter program.

This survey was a formal means to solicit your input. Our chapter board supports ongoing feedback from all of the chapter members. As this year begins, new and continuing board members want to meet the professional needs of the chapter membership. Please communicate your thoughts to any board member.

Some street parking is available on 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup> & 5<sup>th</sup> Avenues, as well as on Cedar Street. However, it is metered, limited to 2 hours, and the Parking Authority enforces the time limitations. So, if you plan to stay for the entire program, there is a paid parking lot adjacent to the CWSL Library (2<sup>nd</sup> & Cedar) and at the Holiday Inn at 2<sup>nd</sup> & Cedar—both lots charge \$6 for a full day.

The lower cost paid parking lots are located along 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue, between Cedar and Ash Streets. Alternatively, the Route 11 bus, which services SDSU, stops within 3 blocks of the school. The Civic Center Trolley stop is 5 blocks from the school. Stations with free parking are indicated by a P (no \* or \$) on the trolley map at <http://www.sdcommute.com/service/trolleymap.htm>.

Attendees had to make tough choices when selecting which programs to attend. SLA's Headquarters staff has asked the Conference Planning Committees for both Los Angeles (2002) and New York (2003) to reduce the number of competing programs by encouraging the Divisions to work together and provide fewer programs of even higher quality.

Although some audience members were disappointed that the two keynote speakers did not address issues precisely relevant to our profession, everyone seemed to enjoy the provocative language of Molly Ivins on Monday, and the irreverence of Dave Berry on Wednesday.

The Association offered a new series of programs this year called Tech Zones, and most were sold out. These were hands-on learning labs on topics like PowerPoint and handheld computers. They received rave reviews and SLA has been encouraged to offer similar sessions in the future. Our San Diego chapter was well represented by both current and past members. Many of us gathered together at the

California reception and then went to the DIALOG event featuring Three Dog Night, an unusual and memorable event.

Association business included the "retirement" of Donna Scheeder as President. She is succeeded by Hope Tillman, whose contributions to SLA in the past have dealt primarily with technology integration and networking. Bill Fisher, from San Jose, is now the President-Elect. Bill is very attuned to the needs of the membership and will do a fine job integrating the findings of the various Task Forces into improvements for SLA.

Included among the highlights of the sessions was one on "Electronic Publishing" with Carol Tenopir and Donald King which offered valuable information on the economics of the journal industry. Another annual favorite was the Dead Technologies session sponsored by the Information Technology Division with comments by three panelists – Stephen Abram, Walt Desmond and Richard Hulser.

#### *Web Shop Demonstration*

*Web Shop* is a fourth generation system, developed in collaboration with IBM, which enables institutions to conduct their subscription management functions via the Internet. 
