Feature

ALLIANT UNIVERSITY (formerly CSPP) AND USIU MERGE LIBRARIES ON THE MOVE

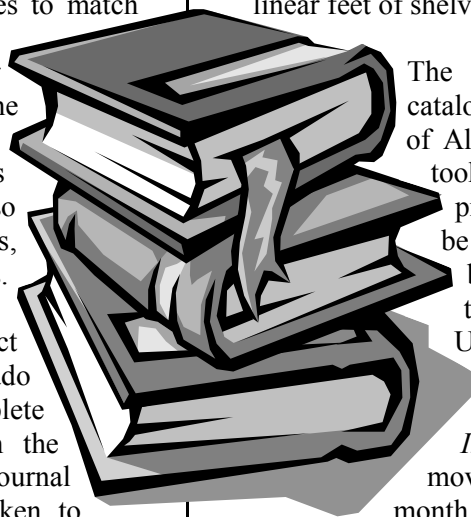
Business mergers are daily happenings, but a merger of two academic institutions is a rarity. Two San Diego academic institutions, Alliant International University (formerly California School of Professional Psychology) and United States International University (USIU) became one of the rarities when they merged in March of 2001. The merger of the two institutions involved some overlap; both institutions included psychology as a major thrust of their curriculum. USIU, however, was an institution catering to undergraduate international students with curriculums in Education and Hotel Restaurant Management and Business. Whereas, Alliant was focused on the graduate student with degrees offered in various psychological curriculums: Clinical Psychology, Educational Psychology, Forensic Psychology and Organizational Psychology.

The curriculums of both schools were strongly supported by each of their libraries. The merging of two libraries was a very major undertaking in the merging of the two schools. The USIU library, on Pomerado Road, had a total of over 100,000 volumes and journals. The Alliant library at the Cornerstone Campus had a volume total of 27,000 books and 300 journals. It was decided by the University-wide library committees, who met in March, to change all the volumes and other non-book holdings such as psychology tests and audiovisual holdings to 14 digit barcodes to match the 14 digit barcodes of the USIU holdings. The rebarcoding was a major project begun at the end of May at the Cornerstone Campus of Alliant. The other campuses of the Alliant family, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Fresno also had to rebarcode their holdings, approximately another 100,000 plus items.

Concurrent with the rebarcoding project was the shelving retrofit on the Pomerado Campus. This, of course, entailed a complete shifting of the books and journals in the library. An investigation of duplicate journal subscriptions was begun and action taken to notify vendors of the duplications. An inventory had to

be done of all the fixtures and equipment at the Cornerstone Campus and decisions had to be made where all the items would be relocated at the Pomerado Campus library. Locations for psychological tests, videos and audiocassettes had to be decided. In addition, locations for new staff had to be selected; locations for existing staff at USIU were changed due to the addition of items to the collection. These new staff areas had to be prepared.

After July 1, when the two institutions officially became one, major emphasis could be placed on the move and merging the two libraries. Additional student staff was used to accomplish the rebarcoding, shifting of books etc. Facilities management staff at both locations worked hard to prepare for the move. A moving team was hired to move the staff, equipment and library holdings to the Pomerado Campus library. The Cornerstone Campus library was closed for about 2 weeks while the books were moved and staff could label and pack all fixtures and equipment for the move to the Pomerado site. The Pomerado Campus library remained open during the move. Loaded on large wooden trucks, volumes were transported from the Cornerstone Campus to the Pomerado Campus library location. Once there, collection items were loaded onto the newly retrofitted shelving, where space had been allotted. The space needed was based on the number of linear feet of shelving the Alliant collection contained



The task of downloading the USIU catalog into the new *Innovative* catalog of Alliant began in early August. This took a few days. After the move, the problem of duplicate volumes would be addressed, as there was little time before the move to accomplish this task. Also just prior to the move, USIU staff was formally trained at a weeklong session, on the different modules of the *Innovative* system. The physical move began at the end of August. The month of September saw items, fixtures,

Program News

Special Librarians in San Diego Share About Their Special Collections

On Friday, September 14, the Chapter held a program meeting titled “Where Can I Find This?: A Survey of Collections of Libraries Open to the Public in San Diego County.” The program was held on the campus of California Western School of Law (CWSL) in downtown San Diego

The first part of the program featured speakers from libraries focusing on the sciences. Susan S. Berteaux, Instruction and Outreach Librarian at Scripps Institution of Oceanography Library, discussed some of the features of the Library’s collection and demonstrated some of the Library’s online resources. Nancy F. Stimson, Outreach Coordinator for the UCSD Biomedical Library, demonstrated online resources available at the Library, as well as other online medical resources. Christine Siegel, the librarian at the city’s Environmental Services Department, discussed the Department’s library and the unique resources on the environment that it makes available to the public.

The focus of the second half of the program switched to law and business. Charles Dyer, Director of the San Diego County Public Law Library, spoke about the Library’s collection, and distributed a variety of handouts on the library’s resources. He discussed the accessibility of the main library and its branches throughout the county. Mike Perkins of the San Diego State University (SDSU) Library discussed business resources available at SDSU. He also demonstrated some of the online resources available to patrons at the Library. A representative from the Lesbian & Gay Historical Society of San Diego was invited to discuss the organization’s archives, but was unable to attend the program. Fortunately, ChimeneTucker, a member of the audience, had previously volunteered with the organization and gave us some highlights.

The program was followed by an optional tour of CWSL’s new library.

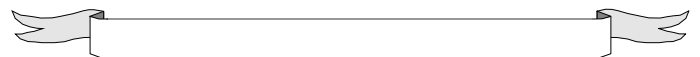

equipment and staff still being located to their new locations at the Pomerado library.

Heavy participation by the University Information Technology Department staff in setting up new systems and modules on the library staff computers was very important after the move. Changes in IP addresses by the Information Technology Department after the move led to a problem of students and staff not being able to access the online databases. It is very important to notify vendors of IP address changes immediately as they occur.

The move and merger of the two libraries entailed much hard work and energy by the staff of both institutions. Much was learned about the intricacies of moving and merging two libraries. The adoption of some to the old protocols and procedures from each institution will be done in the process of developing new protocols and procedures for the new institution. Now the library staff begins the task of working together as a new institutional entity, Alliant International University.

President Karen Sharpe called the meeting to order at 8:40 a.m.

Officer Reports

Past-President:

Mike Perkins mentioned that he is currently revising the chapter's policy and procedures manual and will also be working on the chapter's budget in the near future.

President:

Karen Sharpe reported that she may not be able to attend the SLA Winter Meeting in Chicago from January 24-26, 2002, but that Bobbi Weaver will definitely be going. Karen reminded the group that the chapter can provide up to \$750 for an officer from the chapter to attend.

Karen announced that the *San Diego Business Journal* called to see if the chapter wanted to participate in their dinner on Oct. 11. An email poll of chapter board members concluded that it was not necessary to attend this year.

President-Elect:

Bobbi Weaver reported that the chapter's September 14th program held at Cal Western School of Law was a success. The next program, called "Online vs. On Paper: The Economic Issues of Keeping Print Materials in the Electronic Age," will be held at QUALCOMM on November 16th. She discussed who

the speakers will be and distributed program flyers. Bobbi stated that the February 1st program will be held at the office of a translation software company, and the topic will be international online research. Ann Willard mentioned that in the past the chapter had decided that it did not want vendors to be primary speakers at chapter programs. Bobbi stated that this vendor would not be speaking at the program. The final program of the year will take place on May 31st and will focus on environmental issues in San Diego County. One possible venue for this program is the San Diego Natural History Museum.

Karen mentioned that she received a Board Document from SLA headquarters regarding setting up a memorial fund as a tribute to the victims of the September 11th attacks. The consensus among board members was that contributing to the fund was a good idea, but that the chapter would wait to see if SLA national starts something before it made a monetary commitment.

Secretary:

Elizabeth Grossman stated that she has finalized and distributed the minutes from the July 12th board meeting.

Treasurer:

Deborah Kegel reported that the chapter has a total of \$10,891 in its bank accounts. She mentioned that she has revised the reimbursement form and will soon put it in PDF format and make it available to chapter members.

Directors:

Barbara Busch announced that her co-Director, Kathy Quinn, has a new job with The Dialog Corporation.

Barbara stated that potential dates for the Spring Seminar are March 15 or March 22, 2002. The topic will be digital libraries (from a national perspective), and Barbara and Kathy are currently lining up vendors and speakers for this event. It was said that different vendors have been invited to the Spring Seminar every year, and suggestions for this year's vendors included LexisNexis and EBSCO. Kathy mentioned that her boss at Dialog would help sponsor the Seminar. A

discussion followed regarding how little vendors pay to

rent tables at Spring Seminars. Mike Perkins proposed that the directors be able to spend more money to attract quality speakers to the Spring Seminar and the board members agreed. Barbara and Kathy also reported that chapter members seem to like the structure of the Seminars, i.e., a morning program, lunch, and then an afternoon program.

Barbara suggested promoting the Spring Seminar to other Southern California library associations and asking SLA national to put a notice about the Seminar on their web site.

Karen Sharpe proposed having a student registration price for this year's Spring Seminar, or having a drawing that would provide three library school students with free admission to the Seminar.

A discussion followed about whether vendors are given free lunch at the Seminar, and it was determined that in the past, one representative from each vendor was given free lunch.

It was also proposed that a chapter member be given a free ticket to the Spring Seminar via a drawing. Each time a member attends a program throughout the year, his/her name would be entered in the drawing. A name would be drawn at the February 1st board meeting and the prize would be a free ticket to the Seminar.

Unfinished Business

Membership Directory Online:

Laura Hudson reported that the chapter membership directory is now on the web, though it is not "live" yet. As soon as SLA headquarters assigns passwords it will go "live," and an announcement will be put in the membership bulletin. Laura also mentioned that changes to members' information should be sent to her and Membership Chair Christina Keil.

Policies & Procedures:

Mike Perkins reiterated that the chapter's policies & procedures manual is in progress.

SLA Annual Conference 2002 Sponsorships:

Karen Sharpe reported that she sent a message to SLA headquarters regarding the chapter's desire to sponsor some library school students for the SLA Annual

Conference. SLA responded that they would help by waiving registration fees for the chosen students if the chapter could pay for their meals and lodging. It was moved (Deborah Kegel), seconded (Kathy Quinn) and carried that the chapter sponsor up to three students at \$350 each to attend the SLA Annual Conference. It was decided that library school students who reside in San Diego or Imperial Counties would be eligible. Karen, Deborah and Mike Perkins will work on developing the guidelines and announcement. This "scholarship" will be advertised via messages to the Southern California library school programs and flyers to be handed out in February.

New Business

Holiday Party:

Karen Sharpe announced that she will host the holiday party at her home, and it was decided that the date of the party would be Thursday, December 6th. Everyone should bring hors d'oeuvres, and Karen will provide drinks. The party will last from 5:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., and spouses are welcome to attend.

Spring Seminar Registration Costs for Directors:

Karen Sharpe brought up the issue of whether directors should have to pay for the Seminar, as they have done in the past. It was moved (Mike Perkins) and seconded (Karen Sharpe) that the total cost of the Spring Seminar be forgiven for directors. After much discussion, the Executive Board carried the motion.



SLA Tiered Discussion Lists:

Karen Sharpe stated that SLA national has proposed having tiered discussion. Some of these lists would be restricted to SLA members while other lists would be open to everyone.

Miscellaneous:

Kathy Cook mentioned that Biblioteque, a library software company, is conducting two seminars on November 5th, and that she has passes for these seminars for those who are interested in going.

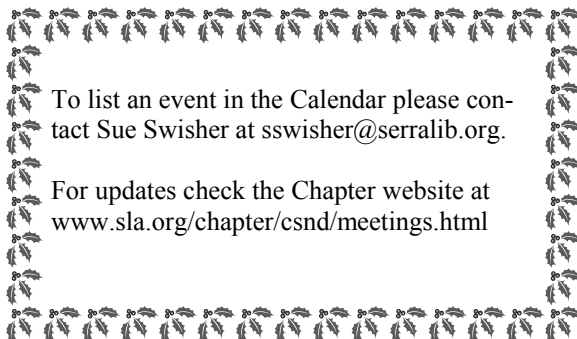
